Kehoe Donates Campaign '98 Papers

Christine Kehoe's historic and precedent-setting campaign for U.S. Congress is now over. She came within three percentage points (at the time of publication) of defeating Republican Brian Bilbray in one of the most closely watched Congressional races in the country.

Despite the loss, the many achievements of Kehoe's campaign should not be overlooked, says Julie Warren, Kehoe's partner who worked full-time on the campaign for the past six months. "Christine is the first openly gay/lesbian to be nominated by a national party to a Congressional office," said Warren. "She is changing the way this city views gay people."

The LGHSSD is pleased and honored to announce that the Kehoe '98 campaign papers are being donated to the Historical Society. They join the campaign materials from Kehoe's historic run for City Council, Third District, in 1993. The archival collection includes news clippings and magazine articles from throughout the U.S., videotapes of television ads, campaign mailers, bumper stickers, precinct maps, and photographs.

San Diegans in Amsterdam: Gay Games 1998

Editor's Note: The memoirs and accomplishments of San Diego athletes comprise a significant part of the Historical Society's archival collections. We have been fortunate to receive materials from members of Team San Diego who participated in Gay Games V in Amsterdam, held August 1 to 8,

1998: Ken Adelson, David Cohen, Terry Trevino, and Garret Demarest. We invite the memoirs of other participants.

Team San Diego was well represented in the Games. There were 136 athletes from San Diego who joined an estimated 15,000 participants from around the world. San Diegans brought home 45 medals (20 gold, 12 silver, 13 bronze), boosting their 1994 New York effort of 32 medals.

Events in which San Diego athletes participated were: badminton, bodybuilding, bowling, cycling, marathon and half marathon, martial arts, powerlifting, rowing, two women's soccer teams, softball, sport climbing, squash, swimming, table tennis, men's and women's tennis, track and field, triathlon and volleyball.
